- 1. Recite from memory, in alphabetical order, the 50 states and their respective capitals. (2 helps)
- 2. Recite from memory, the Gettysburg Address. (3 helps)
- 3. Recite from memory, in order of office, the first and last names of the Presidents of the United States of America. (3 helps-initials only)
- 4. Write the "Pledge of Allegiance" with no spelling errors and no punctuation errors.

 Cursive handwriting is required. (No helps)
- 5. Sing or recite from memory, the first verse of the "Star-Spangled Banner". (No helps)
- 6. Recite from memory, the "Preamble" to the "Constitution of the United States of America". (No helps)

Students who earn an award, will be recognized at an awards assembly near the end of the school year. Fourth grade students are encouraged to begin memorizing these important documents for next year.

Gave proof through the night that our flag was still there.


O, say, does that Star-Spangled Banner yet wave

The Preamble to the Constitution of the United States

We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common Defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

The Gettysburg Address By Abraham Lincoln

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Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field, as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate we cannot consecrate—we cannot hallow—this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain—that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom—and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.
